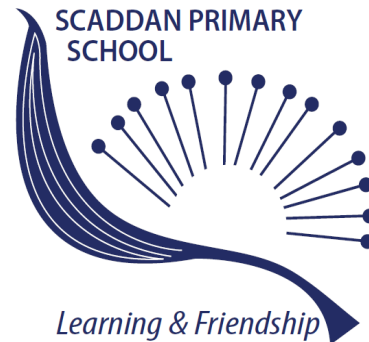

Year 6s - Primary Extension and Academic Challenge (PEAC) at Esperance Primary School

Our Year 6 students, Mitch and Ollie have been selected to participate in a five week PEAC course at Esperance Primary School. The course covers how to use 3D design software, (TinkerCad), to design solutions for problems and then print the design solutions to see if problems have been solved. 3D printing (called additive manufacturing in industry) allows rapid prototyping of design ideas to test design solutions. The course is for academically identified talented and gifted students in the Esperance Regional (Education) Network. As such, Mitch and Ollie will be joining student from Esperance PS and Castletown PS at the course.

Earlier 'Eating Times' for Junior Room students

I believe, in years gone by, our junior students have had a few extra minutes at recess and lunch to allow them to finish eating, before they go off and play. Following consultation with staff, we are trialling our juniors heading to recess and lunch 5 minutes earlier than the senior students.

Already in the few days we have had this in place, we have noticed juniors are able to finish their lunch and snacks, in time to go and play. We will continue to monitor this throughout the term.

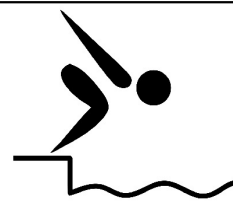

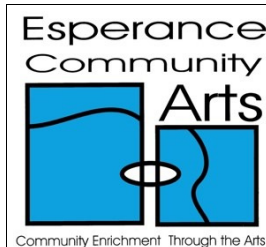
